General Notes: The biophysicist and pharmacologist Murdoch Ritchie was a key figure in the development of neuropharmacology, the branch of medical science dealing with the action of drugs on and in the nervous system. He was best known for his substantial contributions to our understanding of the conduction of electrical impulses in peripheral nerves - particularly nerves in the face, arms, legs and torso.

In his studies of electrical conduction within nerve cells in the early 1970s, Ritchie used saxitoxin, a powerful poison derived from shellfish that kills by causing respiratory failure. It had been developed by the CIA for possible covert uses and stocks, in violation of a 1969 order by President Nixon, had not been destroyed. According to Ritchie, the CIA had kept enough saxitoxin to kill 5,000 people, and he obtained a quantity for his research.

Extremely small concentrations of the toxin block the conduction of electrical signals in nerves and can, therefore, be used to study the function of the nervous system. Ritchie failed to discover a way of counteracting the effects of saxitoxin, his original goal, but his research did suggest how nerve cells lose their electrically insulating layers of myelin. This ultimately rendered the nervous system unable to conduct nerve impulses, leading to multiple sclerosis.

He also studied both the desirable and the hazardous effects of caffeine, publishing his conclusions in chapters in each of five editions of The Pharmacological Basis of Therapeutics, by Goodman & Gilman (1965-1985).

Joseph Murdoch Ritchie was born in Aberdeen in 1925. He studied mathematics and physics at Aberdeen University, graduating in 1944. He then took a post as a research physicist at the Telecommunications Research Establishment at Malvern, where he worked on the development of radar.

In 1946 he became a research student at University College London, in the world's first department of biophysics, working on the dynamics of skeletal muscle contraction. He was awarded a BSc degree in physiology from UCL in 1949 and was appointed a junior lecturer. In 1951 he moved to the National Institute for Medical Research at Mill Hill, North London. He was awarded a PhD in biophysics in 1952 and a DSc in biophysics in 1960, both by UCL.

In 1956 he emigrated to the US and a post in the Department of Pharmacology at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, Yeshiva University, New York. In 1963 he was appointed Professor of Pharmacology there.

In 1968 he moved to Yale as Professor of Pharmacology. He was director of Medical Studies at Yale for 30 years and served on many university committees. An energetic and meticulous experimentalist, he continued to conduct experiments until he retired in 2000. A prolific writer, he wrote and edited more than 70 reviews, chapters, books and monographs. Ritchie was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1976. He received many other honours and awards; he was a founding member of the Society for Neuroscience.

7-Sir Thomas Hanbury^{2,10,43} was born on 21 Jun 1832 in Bedford Road, Clapham, London, died on 9 Mar 1907 in La Mortola, Italy at age 74, and was buried in Cremated at San Remo.

General Notes: Hanbury, Sir Thomas (1832–1907), merchant and gardener, was born at Bedford Road, Clapham, Surrey, on 21 June 1832, the third of five surviving sons and one daughter of Daniel Bell Hanbury (1794–1882), pharmaceutical chemist, and his wife, Rachel, née Christy (1802/3–1876). Daniel Hanbury (1825–1875) was his eldest brother. His parents were members of the Society of Friends and Thomas was sent, aged nine, to school at Croydon, then at Epping, where most of the scholars were Friends. He remained a member of Kingston monthly meeting throughout his life, though all his children resigned.

In 1849, after a brief commercial tutoring by Josiah Richardson, Hanbury was employed by William James Thompson & Sons, tea brokers of Mincing Lane, London. Four years later, with funding from his uncle, he and three companions set up as Hanbury & Co., tea and silk merchants, at Shanghai, arriving during the Taiping uprising of 1850–64. The European merchants lived in a settlement outside the city walls, socially isolated from the Chinese residents. Exceptionally Hanbury chose to learn Mandarin. He travelled widely and was soon respected by the Chinese merchant community. As a member of the Anglo-American Municipal Council of Shanghai he contributed to the planting of gardens and the establishment of a hospital. He became a director of the first railway built in China and from his premises sent the first telegraphic message between Shanghai and Hong Kong.

In 1857 the original partnership was dissolved and Hanbury recruited Frederick Bower to a new partnership as Bower, Hanbury & Co., before returning to England in 1858–9 for a holiday. Adding to his business interests, Hanbury traded in currency for Rothschilds; when the American Civil War interrupted exports of cotton, he bought up Chinese cotton to supply the British market. Investing his growing capital, he became the largest property owner in Shanghai.

During a second visit to Europe in 1866–9 Hanbury went to the south of France, where his brother Daniel had sketched and botanized, and in the spring of 1867 he made his first visit to La Mortola, sited on a small promontory midway between Menton and the Italian town of Ventimiglia. Its setting so entranced him that in 1867 he bought the ruined Palazzo Orengo and its surrounding grounds, intending that he and Daniel, whose interest lay in medicinal plants, would create a botanical garden.

In March 1868 Hanbury married Katharine Aldam (1842–1920), eldest daughter of Thomas Pease of Westbury-on-Trym, near Bristol, and also a Quaker. Daniel began planting a garden at La Mortola while Thomas and his wife returned to Shanghai to settle his business. They chose to make the journey by sea to New York, crossing by train to San Francisco then sailing via Japan to Shanghai where Cecil, the first of three sons and one daughter, was born. They left China in 1871, settling at La Mortola, where they restructured the house and employed gardeners to landscape and plant the 18 hectares of land, regenerating the woodland surroundings by plantings of Aleppo pines and carob trees. Citrus was among their distinctive introductions; over twenty varieties were growing there in 1890. After Daniel died in 1875, Thomas, and later his son Cecil, continued the planting, maintaining the original objectives of scientific experiments in acclimatization, and useful and instructive collections, inspired by their Quaker principles. Hortus Mortolensis, first published in 1889, listed 3600 species growing there. In 1893 Joseph Hooker described La Mortola as 'a garden of exotic plants, which in point of richness and interest has no rival among the principal collections of living plants in the world' (Quest-Ritson, 70). Close links were established with Kew, to which numerous succulents, citrus, and bamboos were sent. Regular reports appeared in the Gardeners' Chronicle. As it matured, the garden was mentioned in Baedeker and other guidebooks, attracting many visitors who were wintering in the south of France, among them Queen Victoria, royalty from Germany and Russia, the prince of Wales (later Edward VII), and other members of the British royal family, as well as such gardeners as Canon Ellacombe.

The scant education available in Liguria, only recently amalgamated with a unified Italy, led Hanbury to build two local schools and to fund their teachers until, with the advent of compulsory education, the Italian government assumed this charge. He also provided other buildings to house libraries, and assumed the presidency of the civic hospital at Ventimiglia. His wife played a part in his many acts of philanthropy. For his services to education Hanbury was created in 1868 cavaliere, later commendatore, of the order of saints Maurizio and Lazzaro; in 1885 and 1888 he was created cavaliere, then commendatore of the Cross of the Crown of Italy. He bought another villa, in which he established the Hanbury Botanical Institute, consisting of a laboratory, herbarium, and museum. It was formally dedicated during the 1892 International Congress at Genoa, and the Italian government awarded him a gold medal as a benefactor of public instruction. He donated plants to many towns along the French and Italian rivieras, presented a monumental fountain to the town of Menton, and paid for the Museum Praehistoricum, a small building to house the prehistoric skeletons and stone tools discovered in

1892 and subsequently in the adjacent cave of Barma-Grande. In 1901, in recognition of his overseas services, Edward VII created Hanbury KCVO. Hanbury was also keen to improve the study of botany and horticulture in Britain. In 1892 he presented his brother's books and collection of materia medica to the recently founded Pharmaceutical Society. In 1903 he presented to the Royal Horticultural Society the 60 acre garden at Wisley, in Surrey, which he had purchased from the estate of the industrial chemist George Fergusson Wilson, who had died in the previous year. This enabled the society to move its experimental garden from the pollution and cramped location of its existing site in the London suburbs at Chiswick. The society awarded him its Victoria medal of honour in 1903.

Even in his last years Hanbury was looking for new commercial ventures. He invested in the Pacific Island Company which traded in guano from Ocean Island. On a trip to Palestine in 1889 he sought in vain to purchase the land containing the reputed tomb of Jesus and he continued to acquire land in Italy. He died at La Mortola on 9 March 1907 after a short illness. Some 7000 local people followed his coffin to San Remo, where he was cremated.

His eldest son, Sir Cecil Hanbury (1871–1937), MP for North Dorset, inherited La Mortola in 1920, and bequeathed it to his widow, Dorothy Hanbury-Forbes (d. 1972), who restored it after the damage and neglect of the Second World War. It was purchased by the Italian government in 1960 and since 1983 has been managed by the University of Genoa, to which in 1998 it was conceded in perpetuity.

19 Dec 1881 (Mon): Went with Lottie and two Miss Webbs, Geraldine and Ethel to Thomas Hanbury's La Mortola – it was more than a two hour's drive, we enjoyed it much, the morning lights on the mountains at the back of Ventimellia and over towards Mentone were wonderfully fine. Tom Hanbury met us at the top of his garden and showed us the various plants & flowers with which he has adorned it from China, Africa, Australia – all seemed to be doing wonderfully well; we went down below the house to where the old Roman road passed - then up again to dinner – a Count Gallianie & wife & 2 children were there, seemed very pleasant people. The marble work on the Terrace outside the windows was beautiful the saloon and logia upstairs splendid, the views of the bay towards Mentone & back our way to San Remo, the mountains above and the sea tumbling over the rocks below, made the place as perfect as possible. General Notes: Captain Christopher 'Beagle' Burne, who has died aged 80, commanded four ships in the Cold War-era Royal Navy and played a crucial if unusual role in the Falklands conflict. Following the Argentine invasion of April 1982, Burne was appointed senior naval officer of the 45,000-ton luxury liner Canberra, which was converted into a troop transport and incorporated into the Task Force sent to retake the islands. The transformation of the ship into a military vessel was a delicate, complex challenge: Canberra already had an experienced master and 400-strong civilian crew, to which were added more than 2,000 marines and paratroopers.

Burne's task was to impose naval discipline and authority, and to do so under the scrutiny of a dozen sceptical journalists. He was frank with the newspapermen, telling them that he did not want them in Canberra and certainly not in such numbers, though later they agreed that Burne was extremely helpful, particularly after the landings in the Falklands had begun. On May 21 1982, during the landings in San Carlos Water, Canberra's size and white hull made her an obvious target, but disembarkation of troops continued throughout the day until they had been landed without loss or injury. As bombs plunged into the water nearby, it seemed impossible that the vast ship could escape. On deck, Burne met the attacks with unshakeable humour and courage, keeping up a running commentary to the frightened men and women below decks and encouraging gunners to "Engage! Engage!" as enemy aircraft swept overhead. It was a performance in the great tradition of eccentric naval officers at moments of crisis and inspired others on board to emulate his apparent nonchalance in the face of danger. Canberra emerged unscathed from some 60 air attacks. Later she returned to a heroes' welcome at Southampton, and Burne was appointed CBE.

Christopher Peter Oldbury Burne was born on January 27 1932 in Alexandria, where his father was serving in the Army. The family moved to France and then to north Devon before the outbreak of the Second World War, at which point Christopher's then retired father re-enlisted; he was captured while serving with the 12th Royal Lancers in North Africa. In 1945 Christopher entered the Royal Naval College, where his enthusiasm for hunting with the college pack, and a perceived resemblance to his favourite breed of hound, saw him emerge with a nickname that stuck for the rest of his career.

He spent the next decade at sea, until he specialised in 1956 as a gunnery officer. In 1958 he was appointed Field Gun Officer at Devonport, responsible for recruiting and training the West Country crew for the annual, fiercely contested, field gun competition at the Royal Tournament. Burne's leadership inspired a clean sweep of trophies by his team. Then, from 1959 to 1961, he was second gunnery officer of the cruiser Tiger while she was flagship of the Mediterranean Fleet. Tiger was a new ship fitted with fully automatic 6in and 3in guns, but these were temperamental, and Burne dedicated himself to understanding the technology behind them and getting them to work.

In 1962-63 Burne was a divisional officer of Grenville division at Dartmouth before, in 1966-67, taking command of the frigates Tenby and Chichester. This was followed by a rare staff appointment: though he could quote the military strategist Clausewitz, Burne was no gilded staff officer; rather, his penchant was for solving practical problems and inspiring his men. In 1971-72 Burne commanded the Royal Navy's leadership school, HMS Royal Arthur, at Corsham, Wiltshire, where all petty officers were sent on first promotion. In 1973-75 he was second-in-

command of the commando carrier Bulwark, and his first appointment on promotion to captain in 1976 was as Director of Naval Physical In 1978-80 Burne commissioned the new Type 42 destroyer Coventry at Portsmouth. The first commission of any ship is always a testing time, and Burne had the additional task of overseeing firstof-class trials of the Westland Lynx helicopter.

After the Falklands conflict Burne was given another challenge: the guided missile destroyer Glamorgan had been damaged in the fighting by an Exocet missile. After dockyard repairs, he immediately guided her back into service, evacuating refugees from Beirut during the Lebanese civil war.

Having left the Service in 1985, Burne spent two years training the Sultan of Oman's navy. Afterwards he continued to hunt with the Park Beagles in West Dorset and was a bell-ringer and lay reader at his local church in Somerset.

Christopher Burne enjoyed cycling holidays, and took his bicycle with him on every warship, arguing that it was the cheapest way to explore new ports. He died while cycling to his village's Diamond Jubilee party.

He is survived by his wife, Belinda Coryton, whom he married in 1969, and their two children.

General Notes: Ashworth, Edmund (1800–1881), cotton manufacturer and free-trade activist, was born on 17 November 1800 at Birtenshaw, Turton, near Bolton, the fifth of the eleven children of John Ashworth (1772–1855), farmer, land agent, and cotton spinner, and his wife, Isabel Thomasson (1772–1852). Edmund was a younger brother of Henry Ashworth (1794–1880), a founder of the Anti-Corn Law League. John Ashworth became a Quaker shortly before marrying Edmund's mother in 1793, and Edmund was raised in the Quaker tradition. He received his early education at schools in Bolton and Manchester, but later studied chemistry under John Dalton. In 1831 Edmund married Charlotte Christy (d. 1868) of Chelmsford, Essex, the daughter of Thomas Christy, a wealthy Quaker business associate of the Ashworths. They had nine children, and lived at Egerton Hall, Turton.

Ashworth joined the cotton-spinning firm of John and Edmund Ashworth, his father and uncle respectively, in 1821. At this early stage they were running a fairly modest business at New Eagley Mills, Turton. Edmund and Henry Ashworth (who had joined in 1818), each took one fifth of the profits, though this was increased to one quarter in 1824. From 1831 onwards they were the sole partners in the firm of Henry and Edmund Ashworth. They invested heavily in their own business, and expansion was rapid throughout the 1820s and 1830s. They purchased a partly built mill at Egerton in the early 1830s, finished building it, and equipped it with some of the best machinery then available. By 1835 when they became the sole owners of the mill, it had a spindleage of 49,000 and a dye works. At the same time New Eagley had a total spindleage of 29,000. By 1854 they had added a weaving shed housing 290 looms at New Eagley and employed 1000 people. Good-quality housing, schools, and leisure facilities were also provided for employees.

Edmund Ashworth declined the invitation to stand for one of Bolton's parliamentary seats in 1837 and 1841, but after the Liberals failed to win a seat in 1837, he helped to secure the charter of incorporation for the town the following year. He never sought election to the borough council. Despite his disinclination to hold public office, however, he remained politically active. He was prominent in both the Anti-Corn Law League and in the Manchester chamber of commerce, then at the height of its powers. Despite his general opposition to trade unionists and Chartists, he solicited their support for the free-trade campaign; he advocated non-payment of taxes, and urged members of parliament who supported free trade to hold up other parliamentary business. It was during this period that one contemporary commented that Edmund was 'a Quaker of the fighting school' (J. W. Croker, 'Anti-corn-law agitation', Quarterly Review, 1, Dec 1842). However, Ashworth did not completely sever his links with Lancashire's gentry and while fighting for the free-trade cause he was also a correspondent and guest of one of the largest Lancashire gentry families, conversing on agricultural matters and attending farming meetings. Ten years later he was to issue a tract on salmon farming.

This political activity, as well as the hardships of the 1840s caused strain on the partnership between the Ashworth brothers. Some of the ensuing disputes were dealt with by Quaker arbitrators, but as the families of Henry and Edmund Ashworth grew, the dissolution of the partnership became more inevitable. This was done in 1854, with Edmund Ashworth taking control of Egerton Mill while Henry took control of New Eagley. In 1864 Edmund retired and control of the firm passed to his sons, Edmund and Samuel, though he remained a senior partner. Edmund Ashworth & Sons was one of the fourteen firms that combined in 1898 to form the English Sewing Cotton Company.

After the battles of the 1840s had been won, Ashworth became less active politically, and the will to expand the business further subsided. The Bolton Free Press, a Liberal newspaper in which the brothers were principal shareholders, ceased publication in 1847, and despite assisting Cobden to negotiate the Anglo-French commercial treaty in 1860, and involvement with the Cotton Supply Association, Ashworth's public life was rather more limited than it had been previously. On the resignation of Henry from the Manchester chamber of commerce in 1868, Edmund Ashworth became vice-president. He declined the presidency in 1871, but took the office from 1875 to 1877. The chamber was not the force it had previously been, however. He was spending more time hunting in Egerton and Scotland, as well as spending much time in Southport. He was appointed to the Lancashire magistracy on 20 April 1847 and served for thirty-four years, during which time he sat on various committees, including the building committee for the new prison in Manchester, and the Salford district finance committee, of both of which he was chairman. He was also chairman of the newly formed Turton urban district council from 1872 to 1880. Ashworth died on 21 March 1881 at the Prince of Wales Hotel, Southport, and was buried at Walmsley church, Egerton, near Bolton.

Although Edmund Ashworth has failed to make the same impact on the historical record as Henry, this is likely to be an accident of the archives rather than a reflection of his contemporary significance. He was clearly a competent and motivated business man, was politically active and outspoken, and evoked both the respect and criticisms of his contemporaries.

The Worsleys were partners in a local bank whose style now became Christy, Lloyd, Winterbotham & Worsley, until it was taken over in 1829 by the Manchester & Liverpool District Banking Company (later, District Bank). A separate firm, W.M. Christy & Sons, Stockport, was established as the first makers in England of Turkish towels; the Old Highgate Mill in the town also became a possession of this firm. He was a founder director of the London Joint Stock Bank (1836). He had married in 1805 Ann Fell (1783-1871), daughter of John Fell (1751-1835) *qv* of Bermondsey, wharfinger, and Mary Fell (born Booth, 1752-1829). There were eight sons and three daughters. His major interest as in ethnology and during the 1850s he travelled throughout the continent of Europe and to North America studying primitive customs, fabrics and artefacts. In 1858 he joined the Geological Society and in the early 1860s he made a special study of flint instruments in the Vezcre valley in France. In 1847-48 he had been equally active as a member of the Meeting for Sufferings committee on the Irish famine, joining in deputations to urge the government to more effective action; he was also engaged in immediate relief measures. Born at Boyton Hall Farm, in 1845, which his father had held under Lord Petre since 1836, he early imbibed a love of the chase, for although his father was a very keen agriculturist, and has, we believe, the credit of being the first to introduce steam ploughing into Essex, he was at the same time a keen sportsman, very fond of a day's hunting or shooting. It will not surprise anyone, therefore, to know that the staghounds met regularly three times a season at Boyton Hall during the masterships of Mr. Frederick Petre and the late Mr. Henry Petre, nor that the subject of our memoir at a very early age became a keen stag-hunter ; in fact, he may be said to have been born one. At 18 years of age — to be more precise, in 1863 — Mr. James Christy began to hunt regularly with the staghounds and was of considerable assistance to the late Mr. Henry Petre, not only in the field but in keeping his deer for him at Writtle, where as a tenant of Lord Petre's he had lived since 1868. A keen and bold rider to hounds, there are few better judges of a horse in the county, and numerous are the prizes over sixty besides "high commendations") he has won in the show ring.

Mary married Joseph Smith,^{68,75} son of Joseph Smith^{2,16,68,75} and Sarah Burgess,^{2,16,68,75} on 6 Sep 1837. Joseph was born on 21 Jul 1813 in Great Bardfield Hall, Great Bardfield, Essex, died on 10 Dec 1904 in Saling, Essex at age 91, and was buried in FBG Great Bardfield. They had seven children: Sarah, Joseph, James Christy, Mary Christy, Abraham, Charlotte Fell, and Anna Bethia.

General Notes: Joseph Smith, 91 10 12mo. 1904 Saling, Essex. An Elder. In the death of Joseph Smith the Society of Friends has lost a strong personality, one whose upright life and consistency of character won universal esteem. Bom in July, 1813, at the time of his death he had more than passed his ninety-first year, and during the whole of his long life he had been active in many forms of public work, and a prominent member of the Society of Friends in the county of Essex. His father was Joseph Smith, of Groat Bardfield Hall, and his mother Sarah Burgess, of Leicester. His family, in direct line, had lived at the Hall in the little village of Great Bardfield, Essex, from the year 1741, all being worthy members of the little Friends' meeting held at that place. He was educated at Colchester, and at Epping, under the care, at the latter place, of the late Isaac Payne, a schoolmaster who seems to have gained the esteem and respect of all his pupils. While at Colchester he remembered being conveyed in a sedan chair, on the occasion of an accident, when he broke his arm, and this memory, linked with the fact that in later years he also rode in a motor car, makes one realise how long a span his life covered. He also remembered as a young man going as "guide " to Stephen Grellet, driving him from Bardfield to Saffron Walden when that valued minister was visiting the meetings of Essex in the year 1832. In 1837 he married Mary, daughter of James and Charlotte (Fell) Christy, of Broomfield, near Chelmsford, and for the next twenty-eight years lived at Pattiswick Hall, near Braintree. Here their seven children were born, three sons and four daughters, the eldest, Sarah, becoming more and more of a companion to her father as their lives drew out together. In 1865 he left Pattiswick Hall, relinquishing the farm to his eldest son, Joseph, and removed to Saling, where he felt free in a farm of his own to carry out many plans which the land laws of the period and the vexatious game laws had hitherto prevented. At the same time he undertook the heavy responsibility of the care of the widow and eleven children of his brother Henry, who had recently died at Bardfield Hall. The eldest son of this family was only seventeen at the time of his father's death, and the fulfilment of this trust, and the care of and for his brother's widow and family during the long period of over thirty years must ever be regarded as one of the achievements of his useful life. As a member of the Society of Friends he was keenly interested in all that belonged to its life and work. He was a most diligent attender at Yearly, Quarterly, and Monthly meetings, and unless prevented by illhealth, was hardly ever known to absent himself from these gatherings, where his wise judgment, wide experience, and practical common sense joined to a warm feeling of love and interest for Friends, made him a most valued help to the meetings. He was always ready to undertake any office requiring sound judgment and special tact. He was assistant clerk and clerk to Essex Quarterly Meeting for many years. A man of a singular combination of modesty of character and confidence in his own opinion, Joseph Smith was a remarkable example of one who would do what he thought right in the face of everything. He took keen interest throughout his life in the administration of the Poor Law. He served his county as a Guardian of the Poor for over fifty years, half of that time as Chairman of the Board. He was a member of the Dunmow Board of Gviardians when it was first formed in 1834, and on removing to Pattiswick in 1833 he became a member of the Braintree Board, and so continued with one year's intermission till 1863, when he was appointed its Chairman, an office which he held for twenty-five years. It is recorded that out of a thousand meetings of the Board, to which he was summoned, he attended nine hundred and seventy. To the deliberations of the Board he brought that soved common sense, energy and earnestness of purpose which were an integral part of his character; and as in all the other relations of life, he won the esteem and respect of those with whom he came in contact. In the references to his death at the Braintree Board of Guardians, special tributes were paid to his honesty, straightforwardness and courtesy in his intercourse with all connected with the work of the Union. After so long a service as a guardian, on his retirement in 1888, Joseph Smith had not in- tended taking up fiu'ther public work ; but the County Council being in process of formation, he received an invitation from a prominent political opponent to become one of the first Aldermen. He was elected, and very shortly became the oldest member of the Council, being then seventy-six years of age. He only retired from this position in 1903, when within three months of ninety. From early days, Joseph Smith was in- tensely interested in politics. . He often said that politics should come next to religion in a man's life. It was a happy recollection of his that during Cobden's advocacy of Free Trade, he was one of the first of the few farmers who held up their hands in its favour at a meeting of agriculturists at Colchester. From the belief that this was the true policy for the country, and in the interests of the people generally, he never wavered, although to him personally as a farmer it was by ho means beneficial. He was for many years President of the Liberal Council for the Maldon Division of Essex. His last public appearance as a politician was on June 3rd, 1904, when he presided at a joint meeting of the Saffron Walden and Maldon divisions held at his residence at Saling. It was remarked how clear was his grasp of the political situation, and how lucid his argument although then within a month of his ninety-first year. The question of the licensing laws formed one of the kaener interests of his later years, and he seldom failed to attend the meetings of the Bardneld Bench of Magistrates, of which he had long been a member. His remarkable constitution and sound health, apparent in his fine commanding figure, triumphed over the accidents which befel him in later life. At eighty years of age he broke his leg through slipping on ice in his garden, but recovered sufficiently to mount his horse again. At ninety he had another fall and broke his hip, but from this he recovered sufficiently to walk about his garden with the aid of a crutch. In 1893, he lost his wife after a singularly united and happy married life of fifty-six years. His constant reference to her in conversation and letters during the later years showed how close was the bond between them. His daughter, Sarah, was now his constant and devoted companion, and the warm welcome they always extended to their large circle of friends and relations, was a notable characteristic of the home life. Both good correspondents, they kept in touch with many at a distance, and although living in a remote village they were full of the interests and sympathies of those who live in a larger sphere. During the last months of his life he had to pass through great trial in the complete prostration of this beloved daughter, who was quite confined to her bed for five months, and unable to give him the unfailing care and sympathy which he had become accustomed to look for at her hands. It was remarkable to see his patience and cheerfulness

imder this trial, and his constant habit of expressing his thankfulness for his " many mercies," notwithstanding the fact that his outward affairs were less prosperous than formerl*, owing largely to the great depreciation in the value of land, in which he had invested most of his savings. He was only confined to his bed for one week, and during that time of pain and weakness his spirit of loving thankfulness was wonderfully touching. His mind was quite unclouded till within a few moments of the end, and his favourite psalm was often altered slightly to express his feelings : " Surely goodness and mercy' have followed me all the days of my life." He died on December 10th, 1904, and was buried in the Friends' Burial ground at Great Bardfield, adjoining the little Meeting-house where he had first worshipped with his parents in his childhood. His daughter, Sarah, only survived him by seventeen days, and thus the two whose long lives had been so largely spent together were scarcely separated. His life may be summed up in the words of his memorial card : " After he had served his generation by the will of God he fell on sleep."

He maintained an interest in public health and did a considerable amount of work in child welfare and antenatal clinics. He also became chairman of the medical boards at Mansfield. In 1948 he was joined in practice by his son. He continued to take a very active part, with a great deal of old-world charm and courtesy, until he retired at the age of 83. The B.M.A. played an important part in his life. He joined in 1907 and in due course became president of the Nottingham Branch. His long, devoted service was recognized by his election as a Fellow of the Association in 1959. After he retired he maintained his interest and continued to attend meetings at Grantham. Dr. Smith was a widower and is survived by three daughters. His son, who had been in practice with him, died 10 days before him.-D.D.

Dr. B. J. Smith, who spent most of his life in general practice at Rainworth, Nottinghamshire, and later at Kettering, died on 19 June. He was 57. Bevan Joseph Smith was born at Braintree on 23 December 1917. He went to Leighton Park School and then to Sheffield University, qualifying in 1941. After hospital appointments at Nottingham he joined the R.A.M.C. When he left the Army he joined his father in practice in the village of Rainworth. He continued there until 1969, when he moved to another practice at Kettering. In the last year of his life he suffered a great deal, but continued to work until very near the end. Outside medicine his main interests were sailing and gardening. But he will be remembered for his devotion to his patients throughout his working life, giving them unlimited time, compassion, and understanding. He will be greatly missed by his old friends in Nottinghamshire and his newer ones at Kettering. Dr. Smith is survived by his wife and two sons. We give thanks for Sam's life. It is a very long life to give thanks for. He was born in April 1917 which was before the Russian October Revolution. Born in the family home at Broomfield Mill, his life came full circle 94 years later when he died in April 2011 in his last home in the Broomfield Mill Barn converted by Peter and Angela, when they were a young couple. He was educated at the Quaker schools at Sidcot (1928 – 1932) and Bootham (1932 – 1935). Sam may have been destined for the milling industry from an early age. In 1933 his Auntie Mary gave him a book on "Organisation and Management in the Flour Milling Industry". He wanted to be a chemist so his farther Percy compromised, or was it Sam who compromised and Sam went to work for G. W. Chitty and Co Ltd in Dover. Chitty's mill was also the home of the pioneers of Cereal Chemistry Dr Kent Jones and Dr Amos where father gained significant knowledge and experience. There began the lifelong passion for cereal chemistry and flour milling. Just before the war, he became a partner in the family flour and feed milling business. He gained a first class in his milling certificate which he studied by correspondence course.

In January 1940 he joined the Friends Ambulance Unit and registered as a conscientious objector. His tribunal in April 1940 assigned him to "Ambulance work under Civilian control". Throughout the war and just afterwards he played a crucial role in humanitarian aid to lessen the suffering caused by war. In the London blitz he did relief work in bomb shelters and for people bombed out of their homes. When they heard that provincial cities such as Coventry, Plymouth and Southampton were being bombed, they drove through the night with masked lights to be there to help in the morning. They set up field kitchens – a skill that came in handy when he later organised the food stops on the Aldermaston marches.

In Cairo in autumn 1941 he joined the No 1 Mobile Hospital run by the Royal Army Medical Corp. He drove the generator truck to power the tented hospital. They moved backwards and forwards across the North African desert according to the military situation. He was in Benghazi in 1941 and Tripoli and Tunis in 1943. Writing home, he told his mother, Dorothy not to worry because the German bombers respected the field hospital's Red Cross pinned out on the desert and the Italian bombers missed! We can't help feeling that, if he was still able, he would be back there today trying to ameliorate the suffering.

In June 1944 he was sent to Bari in Southern Italy to work with a group of about 600 mid European Jewish refugees. He said they "were very traumatised by their experiences and situation. I was able to get tools and materials from an army 'Returned Store Depot '.... I had them making beds out of timber and wire, utensils out of tins etc. We got sewing machines and using old canvas made windjammers lined with old blankets. So they cheered up and gave me a splendid supper and testimonial when I left." When the British Protectorate allowed a quota of 1000 Jewish refugees to

resettle in Palestine, Sam accompanied them on the troopship as a Welfare Officer.

In 1945 - 46 in Ortona in the Abruzzi in Italy, Sam was in charge of the programme to help the local peasants rebuild their houses destroyed in the war. He managed a fleet of 40 lorries for carrying building materials and the wood the peasants collected to trade for tiles to rebuild their roofs.

When Sam was on leave from Ortona in summer 1945, his brother Stephen asked him to come with him to London to help 2 girls move flats. Stephen was a student on George Eglington's farm whose daughter Pearl was studying at the Architectural Association in London. The rest is history. Pearl and Sam got married in November 1946. They moved into the flat at Broomfield Mill, as Sam had rejoined W and H Marriage's and Sons.

Father was for many years a keen participant in the Flour research association at St Albans and latterly the Flour Milling and Baking research Association at Chorleywood. All the research reports from Chorley wood were carefully studied and saved. In 1973 he contacted the Perry Foundation and got them to fund research at Chorleywood on "the effects of fertilizer and nitrogen treatments on wheat". The goal was to see the relationship between wheat production techniques and consumer requirements. This was very much a forerunner of today's vogue for localism and "pip to plate". He developed a system of paying farmers more for growing better quality wheat. He was not just interested in the high tech side of milling and had a close interest in the production of stoneground flour and the early days of organic production or to quote the Farmers weekly in 1974 "Muck and Magic".

He set the focus of the firm onto quality and technical excellence that has provided us with an enduring foundation for today.

Sam was a lifelong member of the Society of Friends. He was clerk to monthly meeting for many years. In the 1950's he oversaw the sale of the large old Chelmsford Meeting House in Duke Street. Then he got 3 for the price of one. The sale of the Duke Street premises financed new Meeting Houses in Billericay (?) and Brentwood (?) as well as this one. For many years he oversaw the management of the building and the maintenance of the garden. He and Pearl arranged the provision of the disabled access and toilet.

He loved swimming. He was in the Bootham School Swimming Team with Richard Branson's dad. Not many people know that. In the Dover Swimming Club he was training to swim the channel before war broke out. In the 1950's and 60's he was a very active member of Chelmsford Amateur Swimming Club. He was the Chair from 19(?) to 19(?). Many people in Chelmsford in their 50's and 60's can swim thanks to him. It only cost 4 old pence for children to swim in the large old outdoor pool in Chelmsford. Sam taught any child who turned up on a Saturday morning and any who came to the swimming club on Tuesday nights. No jostling by pushy parents to get their children into paid swimming lessons for the few. His grandchildren were impressed by Grandpa Sam at Overstrand when he was nearly 70. He swam twice between two breakwaters, got out and said "I'm as weak as a kitten and can't swim like I used to". He only gave up swimming when he got too cold in the water and couldn't warm up afterwards.

Above all Sam was a family man. Pearl and Sam were married for over 64 years and had 4 children: Peter in 1947, Caroline in 1949, George in 1951 and William in 1961. Sam and Pearl moved to Mashbury in 1948 which had a lovely garden for children to play in. Sam created a very productive vegetable garden when they moved to Windmill Pasture in 1956. He always pressed a cabbage or a cat on visitors before they left. When he moved to the barn in 2003 he carried on gardening until very recently.

All 4 children had 3 children each who loved Grandpa Sam as he was such good fun and told such interesting stories. In turn their children boasted at school about their Great Grandpa Sam. After Pearl had her stroke in December 2007, Sam did everything he could to look after her.

In fact everything he did, he did well; everywhere he went he was loved and respected; everyone could rely on him; he left a great mark on the world; and cracked funny jokes. We will all miss him. https://www.justgiving.com/sdmarriage

He goes on, "Mr . Rowntree will tell you I was no good except in the bird line " (Mr. Rowntree tells us nothing of the sort), "so I will tell you a little about the birds here. In the spring there are countless numbers of geese going north. They settle on the stubbles to feed and are very difficult to get near with a gun. Almost the only way to achieve success is to dig a hole in the ground and put out decoys. A piece of tin cut in the shape of a goose will bring them down to feed, and then is the time to shoot, as they don't stay long when they find that the decoys are not live geese. They fly in huge flocks of triangular shape with the apex pointing north. About the middle of October they come south again, as also do the wild turkeys which, if anything, are more unapproachable than the geese* We see ducks of all sorts and sizes, the pintail and mallard being the most common. When the farmers are ploughing in the summer they often come on the nests in the fields. I myself saw one not long ago with seven eggs in it, and the old duck sat still till the plough was only a foot away, when she ran oft pretending to have a broken wing The ploughman moved the nest on the land already ploughed, and the old bird returned to it as soon as he moved away. Then there are plenty of prairie chicken, of a light colour and about the same size as an old--country grouse. In the winter we are deserted by all except the sparrows and snowbirds and a few hawks in the timber. Several species of owls are to be seen from time to time, the best looking being a large white one, bigger than any of his kind at home. Just here we are on the plain bare prairie, with not a tree for miles, and it looks pretty bleak when the thermometer gets down to 360 below zero In the fall I drove out to Long Lake in a two-horse democrat. There was no trail for most of the way, and as there were a few new houses, the farmer who drove us mistook some of the landmarks, and we rattled over the prairie at a good pace in the hope of hitting the right trail somewhere later on. At last we reached a ravine with a few small lakes at the bottom, and knew where we were. I don't know that 1 am particularly nervous, but I did not think much of the place where we decided to cross, as it was strewn with boulders of no small size and an upset seemed almost certain. I don't fancy any sane man in England would drive down a place like that, but out here they don't mind taking a few chances. We got safely down and up the other side, however, and then drove on to the lake. Looking down hill we saw the Arm river covered with geese, and then, after skirting the lake, we rattled down a steep hill at the foot of which stood a charming little stone house overlooking the water. Here we were warmly welcomed by the proprietor, a Yankee farmer who had bought the place a year before. After dinner we talked over various political questions affecting this country, and finally the old Yankee got on to the recent war. He maintained strongly that it was not the proper way to settle difficulties by killing one another, and insisted that some other and less barbarous method would have to be found. It seemed odd to hear a man who had probably never heard of the Society of Friends talk like that, but it made me feel that there must be more people holding Friends' views with regard to war than some people think.... It was an ideal spot, this, looking over the lake about a mile wide, to the opposite shore where two green-houses were conspicuous among the trees and a bare stubble field or two on the hillside above. A stern-wheel steamer came by as we looked, frightening a great flock of geese, and then we turned back and hitched up for our ride home. Driving straight across the prairie we passed three wolves, separately, each standing up on a hill and looking like a statue. ... I missed Old Scholars badly, but I shall get to York again at Whitsuntide one of these days. You may be sure that when a man has been four years in succession, he doesn't care to miss it. I'm sorry I can't send any photos, but I'm too far from 'the madding crowd's ignoble strife,' as Mr. Brayshaw would say-" Marriage.— On 31st July, 1949, at Bath, Neville Marriage (1895-98), aged 67 years.

R. Miller Christy, F.L.S.

Early in Lawrence Street days the father of two boys from Leeds wrote most gratefully to John Ford because he had cured them of their instinctive delight in mischief. By his wonderful genius John Ford, discovering their bent for natural history, had diverted their super-exuberance into this path. One of them, Tuffen West, early and long made his mark in that field. Not otherwise was the case, in the year that saw the passing of John Ford, with a small Essex boy, Bob Christy, who found that time was too precious to spare for " columns " instead of being devoted the beloved Natural History Room. Coming to Bootham in 1874, and staying until 1877, our Society reports chronicle his activities and services to the School. Most valued ever since are his MS. lists of birds seen on the School premises and the York molluscs. He retained his interest when an Old Scholar, above all by organising prizes for Natural History seays. By developing this into the Inter- School Diaries Competition for Friends' Schools, he widened the field for a work so valued that it has now been carried on for over 40 years. From him, too, when still at school, came the name of, and valued aid in starting, that most successful of our schools periodicals, The Natural History Journal. In 1880, when only 19, his organising capacity led to his selection to go out for James Hack Tuke's emigration com- mittee after the famine to settle Irish peasants in Manitoba. This involved him in journeys of nearly 24,000 miles. But his life work was an ahistorical catalogue of thich be was a membry, contributions to the Dictionary of Natural Biography, the Victoria History of Essex and numerous standard works of reference. His latest was a historical catalogue of tinder boxes and other fire-lighting appliances in the unique museum at Bryant and May's works. Of this he became curator and enriched it from his own collection. He was possibly the foremost archaeologist in Essex as well as a leader in many branches of Natural History. He was a high authority on the Bri

From 1898 to 1900 Christy was senior medical officer to the Second Battalion, West African Field Force in northern Nigeria, after which he served for a brief time in India. Christy was a member of the first Royal Society Africa Sleeping Sickness Commission in 1902, and then worked upon two other expeditions researching the disease organised by the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine and the Sudanese Government. From 1903 to 1910, he travelled widely in Ceylon, East Africa, Uganda, southern Nigeria, the Gold Coast and the Cameroons. Between 1911 and 1914, Christy worked for the Belgian government, investigating sleeping sickness and rubber cultivation in the Congo, and collecting zoological specimens for the Museum of the Belgian Congo.

During 1915-1916, Christy mapped the Nile-Congo boundary for the Sudanese Government, and then served in East Africa and Mesopotamia as an army medical officer. Between 1920 and 1923 he explored the Bahr-el-Ghazal River. From 1925 to 1928, Christy led a zoological expedition to Lakes Tanganyika and Nyasa, collecting specimens on behalf of the British Museum. In 1930, he chaired the Commission set up by the League of Nations to enquire into slavery and forced labour in Liberia. Christy died on 29 May 1932, after being gored by a buffalo while on a zoological investigation in the Belgian Congo.

The church service was well taken by a lady minister who was an ex-WRAC (Womens Royal Army Corps) and had served in one of Naomi's previous British Army appointments. An impressive eulogy was given by a WRAC Lt Colonel. Naomi had been a great sportswoman before WW2 in riding, tennis and squash, playing and riding in the USA and Europe before she joined the Army when WW2 broke out.

Some of us had last seen Naomi when Gillian Wills (Justin's Wife) brought her to a Lasham competition about three years ago. She had been taken soaring and had been anxious that the matron of her nursing home should be told that she was going to be late on parade!

After the service there was a reception at Government House, a British Army staff mess (officer's club) near the Queen's Hotel which is close to the ex-IAM site at Farnborough (the site of the international air display).

My own remembrance of Naomi is not only as a dedicated glider pilot who once held the Irish Altitude record and was a BGA official, but as being as "pleased as Punch" (if that is an acceptable phrase nowadays, one has to be so careful) to be sitting in a tow aircraft with a throttle in one hand and a stick in the other. Not usual for a senior female British Army Officer! God speed, Naomi, we will all join you in "the great thermal in the sky" sometime, and no doubt have a great discussion of this and that. Even the lovely lady minister who took the funeral service agreed that this was possible when I put the proposition to her over a glass of "this and that" provided kindly by the British Army who, I am glad to say, look after their own in appropriate style *Ian Strachan*

Fell Christy established his reputation as a millwright but secured it in the adoption of new technology, principally the rights to use American equipment such as the Carter "Disintegrator", which was claimed to reduce to powder, anything at all.

Christy, Fell (1835-1918), brickmaker, milling engineer, was born at Broomfield, near Chelmsford, 5 August 1835, son of James Christy (1787-1874), farmer, and Charlotte Christy (born Fell). He married, perhaps in 1860 (not according to Friends' usages) Esther Coleman. There were four sons and five daughters. He had been a brickmaker, but in the mid-1860s he established the firm of Christy & Norris, milling engineers. He died at Chelmsford 6 October 1918. *Edward H. Milligan. British Quakers in Commerce and Industry - 1775-1920.*

Chelmsford. The eldest child of Fell and Esther Christy.

This dear child always found so much pleasure and encouragement from reading in the Annual Monitor, that it is thought a few particulars of his short life may be interesting to some of his own age ; and that they may be strengthened and stimulated by reading of his love to his Heavenly Father, and of his constant endeavours to walk in His fear.

Johnnie was always loving and dutiful to his parents, very thoughtful in trying to please others, and fearful of grieving any one. From a very early age, he possessed a great and constant faith in his Heavenly Father's protecting care. He believed fully in the efficacy and power of prayer ; and whenever any little difficulty arose either in work or playtime, his habit was to take the matter to God, and cheerfully rely on His answer. As an instance of this, - in his seventh year he attended a day school, and some rude boys often teased him on his way by throwing stones, and using vulgar expressions. He was so grieved, that he made it a subject of prayer that they might not do so again ; and on his return that evening he told his mother, that he was quite sure God answered prayer, for there were none of those rude boys about that day. At another time, when his father had just left home for Ireland, he saw his mother much depressed ; and coming to her said, "Dear mamma! don't grieve; I am quite sure papa will be brought back to us again, because I have asked God to bring him ; so you need not think anything more about it, for he is sure to come home safely." Many other instances could be brought forward, to show that he habitually made mention of his need to his Father in heaven.

And he always acquiesced in the answer which he believed he received, even if it were not in the exact way he asked for; feeling assured that the will of God was best for him, - and any concerns he was interested in, even such small things as the difficulties of a hard lesson or sum, were not thought too insignificant to ask for help to over- come. But it must not be supposed that the dear child had no sense of sin, or struggles to maintain the right path ; for he often expressed his sorrow, that when he would do good, evil was present with him. When twelve years old, Johnnie was sent to Croydon School with two of his sisters, and it was very touching to notice how thoughtful and kind he was to them. His teachers and companions were soon conscious that his endeavours to live rightly possessed a decided influence over many of them; and he became greatly endeared to those who came in his way. His serious talks with some of his schoolfellows have been mentioned by them since his death, as having had a great effect upon them. One of the boys speaks especially of the last conversation he had with John, when he said, " I feel sure I am going to die, and I feel so naughty;" - and then they talked it over, as they were in the habit of doing, after which they prayed and went to sleep.

Very often Johnnie used to ask his friend, if he had noticed his doing anything during the day that was not right; and if so, they talked it over, and he was careful not to do it again. John Fell Christy had been at Croydon two years, when the death of one of the teachers, Louisa Cruikshank, (whose good influence had been much felt in the school) took place after a short illness. At her funeral, Ann F, Fowler spoke particularly to the children; telling them to ask themselves the question, whether they were prepared to go if they were called next; and that night John told one of his schoolfellows, that he felt as though he should be the next. A few days after, having been attacked by fever, it was thought best to send him home at once, which was a great relief to him. The next morning, when his mamma went into his room, he said, " Oh, mamma; how good God is ! for we could not have one thing without His goodness, not even to be brought home as I have been; - and especially in giving me such nice, kind parents." His mother replied, " Yes dear, and most of all, He gave His own dear Son to die for us, and that is more than all." He answered, "Yes, mamma dear! He did." Johnnie then said, " Wasn't Louisa Cruickshank's death very sudden ? She was only ill a fortnight; - we were all so sorry." His mother replied, "I have no doubt, dear, that it was in God's own wise ordering for the good of those who were left;" when he answered, " Yes, I am sure of that, mamma; for it has made me very thoughtful. We had such a nice meeting at her funeral. A friend said, ' We cannot tell who may be the next; ' and I thought I should, mamma." The next day his mother had been reading to him, when after lying still awhile, he sweetly looked up and said, " Jesus has crossed out all my sins, mamma, I am sure of it - every one - but the worst is, I add more so soon; - but I go to Him daily and nightly, and He crosses them all out. I can see Him cross them all out, mamma." Another day when kissing his mother he said, " You are such a dear mamma." She replied, " Yes, dear, but Jesus is better ;" when he brightly answered, " Yes, ten times /"

After telling the nurse one day that if he got well he was going to Walton, she said to him, "I think, dear, you are going to heaven; - because you know you don't get much better." Dear Johnnie cheerfully replied, "I hope so, nurse; - and I hope papa and mamma, and my brothers and sisters, and all my friends and relations, and all, and all may come too."

One afternoon Johnnie said, "I think I am a little better to-day : "but raising his eyes he continued, "Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven." At night he said, "Now I should like to settle to bed very early. Please nurse, put the light down, - and mamma, lie down on the sofa." Then as if thinking himself alone, and as was his usual practice, he folded his hands, and offered an earnest prayer ; asking Jesus to cross out all the sins he had committed since he ashed Him last, and much more that could not be understood ; although it could be heard that he was praying for his parents, and brothers and sisters. His resignation and thankfulness during his illness were extreme. He was constantly fearful of grieving his Heavenly Father, and was only sorry to give (as he thought) so much trouble to others ; asking to be told if he ever omitted to say u please " or " thank you," which however he never forgot to say. At the end of three weeks the disease seemed to be overcome, and the doctors gave a little hope of recovery. His father said to him, " I think, dear, it may please God to spare you to us." Johnnie answered, " I think not papa, but His will be done." The next day serious symptoms set in, when it soon became evident that the patient sufferer would not be long with us.

In the early morning of the last day of his life, he sent for his mother, who had just left his room; exclaiming, " Oh mamma! my pain is so bad, I don't know what to do." She told him she would take it all from him if she could ; but she could only pray for him, that it might please God to remove it, or if not, to enable him to bear it. He begged her to kneel down then, and afterwards repeated the prayer, and looked calmed and quieter. His sufferings that day were very great, and he more than once petitioned for help to bear them. He also told his parents how much he prayed for them, and asked them not to grieve.

Thinking that he did not quite realize that his end was so near, his mother said to him that evening, " My dear boy, you will soon be * Safe in the arms of Jesus,' " when he enquired " Am I going to-night, mamma ? " " Yes, darling, we think so." - " Oh, I did not think it would be quite so soon." When told that being in heaven would be far better than being in pain here, he said - " Oh yes ! I know that, but I did not think it would be quite so soon." After nurse had repeated part of the 23rd Psalm to him, and the hymn -

" Jesus can make a dying bed Seem soft as downy pillows are," he said, "Thank you, nurse ; now I should like to be quite alone a little while " - and was apparently in earnest prayer. After that, his death seemed no more a surprise or trouble to him. During the last few hours of his life, his brain was so much affected, that only gleams of consciousness were visible; but all the time his happy faith and trust in his Heavenly Father were apparent. He suffered much ; and when the night seemed long to him, he spoke of wishing Jesus would come quickly, adding " My mamma did say it would be to-night." He afterwards said, "Good bye ! I think I am going now, - oh ! I can see God ! He is holding out His arms to receive me. I hope I am going to Him, to be one of His redeemed children, to help to do His work there." And we may believe that when the close came in the early morning, this dear child was taken to be for ever with the Lord, whom he had loved and trusted in. during his short life on earth.

Frank however, supported and encouraged by Col. Crompton, branched out on his own within two years. After five years of establishing himself, he brought his brother Leonard into the enterprise, to trade as Christy Bros., later Christy Bros & Co Ltd..

The provision of commercial lighting equipment, often installed in conjunction with milling equipment by his father's company on some sites, helped ease the transition into domestic installations. In time, this resolved into providing community based electrical generating plant, serving villages and small towns in the south of England, prior to WWI.

This naturally led to the establishment of a local example of the later, national Grid.

The North Somerset Electric Supply Company was but one brick in the early edifice, covering 600 square miles of the West country. The West Devon Electric Supply Company, covered 830 square miles. The Milford on Sea Electric Supply Company, The Bude Electric Supply Company, the Aldeburgh Electric Supply Company, The Mid-Somerset Electric Supply Company, The Culm Valley Electric Supply Company, The Burnham District Electric Supply Company, The Holsworthy Electric Supply Company, The West Devon and Mining and Power Company Ltd., are all examples of local electrical generating and distribution companies, which Frank helped establish and which later, were subsumed into the wider production facility that we know today. Rural power generation and been given a boost, when Frank turned his attention to hydro-electric power, utilising the resources of the river Tavy draining Dartmoor. This became and remains still, the largest hydro-electric scheme in England... still operating after more than 75 years. A testament to a gifted Quaker engineer, who incidentally chose to power the generating plant, with turbines manufactured by other Quaker engineers in Kendal, Cumbria.... he used two 320kW Turgo impulse turbines by Gilbert Gilkes & Co.

Tom lived his life in a spirit of abundance and joy. He worked to resolve challenges with enthusiasm and practical creativity. Tom was sensitive to others' needs and quick to ofer both emotional and practical help. His playful wit made many a dry Quaker committee pleasurable. He lived the Quaker testimony to simplicity with a quiet, persistent grace, never ostentatious in dress or lifestyle. Tom was a good and faithful Friend from childhood to his death aged 84 in 2014. Tom's lodestones were his family, Quakers, the environment and technological innovation. Tom once said of meeting: "In my younger days, the dominant reason [for my attendance] was to learn from the meeting - and to develop my understanding of life - physical, mental and spiritual - and my values. I then found ways I could contribute as well as receive, and hence developed a feeling of being part of a community to which I owed a duty. Meeting has become a valued and central part of my life which I would feel deprived of if I lived out of reach of a Quaker meeting." In meetings Tom always spoke quietly, but with authority. Over his 57 years at Cotteridge Meeting he served in numerous capacities: overseer, elder, treasurer and clerk amongst others. Tom undertook what he called "a whole new career" when, in 1996, he became treasurer of Warwickshire Monthly Meeting. Tom had a rich baritone singing voice and derived much pleasure from music, enriching both Cotteridge Meeting's social and practical activities. Tom's rendition of "Right Said Fred" greatly sustained Cotteridge Friends' DIY revamping of the meeting house in 2006. Tom supported the Leaveners, singing in The Gates of Greenham, Cry of the Earth, Embracing the Tiger, and Woolman's Witness. Born in Portadown, Northern Ireland, Tom was the youngest of fve children in a Quaker family. Every morning after breakfast, joined by their domestic staff, the household read from the Bible. From a very young age he opted to sit through the whole of their Quaker meeting. The ideals of public service exemplifed by generations of his family took deep root in Tom's own character. Tom boarded very happily at Leighton Park School before studying Mechanical and Electrical Engineering at Queen's University, Belfast where he met Isabel. In 1955, having completed a graduate apprenticeship with Rolls Royce, Tom joined Cadbury Brothers Ltd and married. Cadburys seconded Tom to their factory in Tasmania for a year. Here he and Isabel took great joy from both Hobart Quaker Meeting and the natural beauty of Tasmania. On their return to England in 1957 the Greeves settled in Bournville, Birmingham, and became part of Cotteridge Quaker Meeting. Suzy, Geoff and Marion joined the family, and the meeting, in due course. In the mid 1970s, dawn of the digital age, Tom, constantly desiring to be at the cutting edge of technology, completed an Open University degree in Electronic Engineering. At Cadbury's, meanwhile, Tom developed the Systems Engineering Department. Tom had a 'conversion experience' when he read Limits to Growth in 1972, halfway through his life, leading to a passionate concern for the health of our earth. His response, which took much of his time in the second half of his life, was wide ranging and practical as well as intellectual. From 1971-2003 Tom served as a trustee of the Bournville Village Trust (BVT), acting as vice chairman for 14 years. Tom steered the

BVT decisively towards sustainability. He was the catalyst for a growing commitment to the need for energy saving technology in buildings ranging from the innovative Solar Village of the 1980s to the Shenley Development launched in 2003. Tom co-authored several academic papers for the International Solar Energy Society based on this pioneering work. Tom quietly began work on reducing energy use at Cotteridge Meeting House in 2002 with donations of a solar thermal panel and, later, of double glazed window panels to replace the 'glass walls' (which had been cutting edge design in 1964). Tom's constancy supported the small Cotteridge Meeting Living Witness Group, which informed and encouraged meeting in its energy saving measures from 2004 through 2011, resulting in energy use reduction of over 90%. When issues afecting the environmental impact of the meeting or meeting house came before local business meeting, Tom invariably spoke clearly and movingly on their behalf. Central England Quakers agreed, in 2007, to create the Northfeld Ecocentre, a project which promotes sustainable living. Tom was deeply involved from its inception and planning. He contributed funding, time and practical ingenuity to make the Ecocentre, an old building, a demonstration of energy efciency. Tom acted as Ecocentre treasurer for six years, a vital support to the new project. He was key to the success of the Ecocentre. Tom's deep commitment to peace and the protection of our environment is expressed in his own words in his contribution to Cotteridge Meeting's 2004 'Living Minutes' project: "...we are people trying to learn to live in harmony with one another and to care for a lovely planet...the meaning and purpose of life is therefore centred around that endeavour, lightened by beauty, joy and laughter. To succeed we need to develop the power of love, and not the love of power, and to open our hearts and minds to the leadings of the Spirit of Love". It is difficult if not impossible for those who are unfamiliar with social life in the north of Ireland to realise how great is the loss which Friends in the Province of Ulster have sustained in the passing away of so rare and vigorous a personality as that of Jane Marion Richardson. She was a remarkable figure in a remarkable community. And it is, perhaps, only by studying the story of her ancestry, as told by herself in "Six Generations of Friends in Ireland," that an outsider can be brought in any degree to understand something of the spiritual inheritance which was handed down to her from her strong, God-fearing, Puritan ancestors, to grasp the conditions into which she was born, and to enter into the atmosphere which surrounded her throughout the whole of her long and beneficent and honoured life. In this series of brief biographies we are shown a noble band of men and women, steadfast followers of God, many of whom endured hard things for conscience' sake, rejoicing that hey were counted worthy to suffer in the service of their Master. The founders of the Irish houses of Wakefield and of Richardson were soldiers. " All our ancestors," wrote John Grubb Richardson, " came from the north of England in Cromwell's army." Among them were no fewer than three of Cromwell's officers. One of these, Colonel Clibborn, although at first a bitter opponent of Quakerism, joined Friends, and shaped his whole after-life and conduct in accordance with their clear and simple faith, ultimately suffering great hardships, and narrowly escaping with his life, at the hands of James II.'s ill-disciplined and barbarous soldiery. The Jacobite officer commanding at Athlone asked him to point out the men who had assaulted him, declaring that they should be hanged at their victim's own door. "But he refused, saying that he bore them no ill, and only desired that his neighbours and himself might be allowed to live unmolested." A well known ancestor of the Wakefields was Colonel Whalley, first cousin of Cromwell, and one of the Regicides. A still more striking figure was Whalley's son-in-law, Major-General William Goffe, a man who was at once an intrepid soldier and an acceptable preacher and expounder of the Scriptures, - a combination characteristic of his time - and who, from the point of view of the historian, was the most remarkable figure in the family records. It was he who, in company with Colonel White, expelled from the House of Commons the scanty remnant of the Barebones Parliament. Like Colonel Whalley, he signed his name on the death-warrant of the King. He was one of the ten Major-Generals entrusted by Cromwell with the task of keeping the country in order. He commanded the Protector's own regiment at the Battle of Dunbar, he was present amid the horrors of the storm of Drogheda, when only one man out of a garrison more than 3,000 strong is said to have escaped alive, and his descendants live to this day on the estate that was given him in reward for his services. He did not enjoy it long. At the Restoration he and two other of the Regicides fled to America, where, although sheltered by the authorities, they were forced to spend the rest of their lives in concealment. The circumstances in Hawthorne's story are somewhat different, but there is at least a strong probability that Major-General Goffe was the prototype of the Grey Champion in one of that author's "Twice Told Tales." The old Parliamentary leader lived and died in the Puritan faith, but his son, Richard, joined Friends. And his great grandson, Jacob Goffe, proved that he was cast in no less heroic mould than his ancestors, not by prowess on the battlefield, nor by the use of deadly weapons, but by his noble and consistent and Christian bearing amid the perils of the Irish Rebellion. He refused to leave the ancestral home in the county Wexford and seek safety in flight, having decided that it was his duty to remain, placing his dependence on "Him who alone can protect, and who has promised to preserve those that put their trust in Him." The decision cost him dear. His family and he were unwilling witnesses of some of the worst horrors of that awful time. From his house was seen the smoke of the blazing barn in which nearly 200 men, women and children were burnt alive by the rebels. A battle was fought before his very door. His property was seized, his life was threatened. And although, through all his trials, his faith never failed him, his health gave way under the repeated shocks to which he had been exposed, and he died a few days before the close of the year of the Rebellion. No murmur of complaining or regret escaped him. When very near his end he exhorted one of his daughters not to weep for him. "Rather rejoice," said he, " and be thankful that the Almighty has been pleased to permit me to die in peace, and with my dear family about me, and not by the hands of wicked and unreasonable men." Courage of another kind was shown by Jacob Goffe's grandson, Thomas Christy Wakefield, who was one of the earliest supporters of the temperance movement, at a time when total abstinence was not only scoffed at by the world, in general, but was eyed askance even amongst Friends. No reader of the records given in "Six Generations of Friends in Ireland " but will realise that such lives were spent in a spiritual atmosphere of marvellous clearness, in a state of close communion with God; that they were characterised by supreme self-sacrifice, by untiring labour for the good of others, by profound humility, and by absolute faith in the promises of God. And the more we learn of the family story, the more clearly do we see that, although some of these figures seem to

stand out with special prominence by reason of a certain picturesque-ness of circumstances and surroundings, the record of to-day is to the full as heroic as that of bygone centuries; that as noble as any are the lives that are not of books nor of the distant past, but that have been lived in recent years and in our own time. And it is the testimony of all who knew her, whether rich or poor, gentle or simple, that of such was the life of Jane Marion Richardson. For some years after his marriage, her father, Thomas Christy Wakefield, the second of the name, a liberal-minded and enlightened man, grandson of the Jacob Goffe who suffered so keenly amid the troubles of 1798, resided near Dublin ; and there, among " the fascinations of society and the enjoyment of field-sports, the still small voice " which, in earlier years, had called him to his Master's service, " was well-nigh silenced." However, an attack of fever, so severe that there came a time when the three doctors in attendance thought that life had actually left him, led to his retirement to Moyallon, a township in County Down, one of the seats of the linen industry established by Huguenot refugees, after the massacre of St. Bartholomew. Here he lived a quiet, country life, taking his full share in the interests and affairs of the Society, while his hospitable home, where, if possible, the poor were more welcome than the rich, became a centre of usefulness, and a strong influence for good. Here, in 1831, was born his second daughter, Jane Marion, the subject of this memoir. Living as she did, in a home whose atmosphere was one of orthodox Ouakerism, she early showed evidence of the qualities which characterised her later years; and even in her childhood she exerted, while enjoying to the full the freedom and delight of Irish country life, a marked and happy influence. She was only seven when, as she herself has described, she was taken by her father to see Father Mathew administering temperance pledges in the market place of a neighbouring town; and then and there, amid the crowd of kneeling peasants, she. too, made the promise and received the coveted medal. It was the first act in a long career of earnest work for temperance, a cause very dear, in after years, both to herself and to her husband. He, it may be added, had early become a total abstainer for the sake of the example to others; and, with wise and beneficent autocracy, he allowed no public-house on the Bessbrook estate, to the infinite advantage of his many work-people. When Jane Marion Wakefield was thirteen, her parents removed, for the better education of their children, first to Exeter, and then to Falmouth, where she spent four happy years; and where among Friends remarkable for their culture, both spiritual and intellectual, there was awakened in her mind, more particularly by Robert Were Fox, of Penjerrick, that interest in nature, in birds and flowers and scenery, which helped to colour her life. The terrible potato famine that broke out in 1846 recalled the family to Ireland; and among the poor tenants on her father's estate, at Burtown in county Kildare, the girl of seventeen began her career of benevolence, denying herself all luxuries, and striving hard to supply both the bodily and spiritual needs of the peasantry, by whom her labours of love were long and gratefully remembered. In 1853, at the age of twenty-two, she became the second wife of John Grubb Richardson, of Brookhill, near Lisburn; and she at once threw herself heartily into the schemes of that remarkable man for the benefit of the working classes in Ulster. In 1859, the home was removed to Moyallon, and the Richardson household became from that time a centre of religious and social activity, and of far-reaching influence which, ever since, has been a source of untold benefit to the country round. Knowing only too well the baneful effects of the drinking habit on the people, John Grubb Richardson would allow no alcoholic drink on his estate or among his workers; and his name and the name of his wife will long be cherished in the grateful hearts of hundreds who, through a means which some even of our legislators affect to call an interference with the liberty of the subject, are now living in prosperous homes in America and the colonies, and who owe all that they have and all that they are to the benign influence of the household at Moyallon. Nor was the work of John Grubb Richardson and his wife by any means confined to the cause of temperance. They established schools, they founded religious services. They endeavoured in every possible way, to promote the best interests of the people among whom they dwelt. And in every good work, in every plan for the benefit of others, Jane Marion Richardson played a most important part. "Sharing with a true mother's sympathy in the very varied interests, political, intellectual and religious, of the home life of Moyallon," writes one who knew her well, " she embraced many less highly-favoured than her own family in her large-hearted activities." "From the beggar to the peer," said one of the speakers at her funeral, "she profoundly impressed all who came into close contact with her." Her interest in and influence over young men was a special feature of her life. Through many a long year the familiar form of "The Misthress," driving her spirited pony along the roads and lanes of Moyallon, brought practical help and spiritual consolation to many a cottage door; and when, in recent days, illness and declining powers had done their part, the tender devotion of the warm-hearted Irish peasants, who looked eagerly for the little donkey-carriage with its beloved occupant, was too deep for words. It is rare indeed to see the combination of a perfectly ordered home life in the midst of active and pressing responsibilities, with the whole-hearted surrender to the Divine call in the public ministry of the Gospel; and in both these directions we can truly say that our dear friend " adorned the doctrine of God her Saviour." Those who, for longer or shorter periods, have been privileged to share in the happy atmosphere of the home at Moyallon, have, in large measure, realised the ideal of a thoroughly natural and many-sided family life; inspired at every point by the unmistakable aim "This one thing I do." A Friend who resided at Moyallon House for eighteen months, after referring to the varied forms of service in which John and Jane Richardson were so closely united, writes : " Linked with this beautiful and never-tiring work for others, was a perfectly harmonious home and family life, so that as I shared in its interests and pleasures as well as in its duties, I had always before me, in dear Jane Richardson, an embodiment of the spirit of Christ, and a realisation of what a Christian home was designed to be." Another feature of her character was her love for children. Fifty thousand copies of her little book "The Children's Saviour "were sold before her death. Another publication of hers, entitled "Six Generations of Friends in Ireland," a work which, originally intended only for the family whose ancestors are described in it, is now in its third edition, has supplied much of the material for this imperfect sketch. A marked characteristic, as is noted by the Irish Times, was Jane Marion Richardson's "love for her country. She always preferred to give her energy and her means to Irish objects." Her religious outlook which, in earlier life, had been beset by doubt and self-distrust, was strongly influenced by the earnest and convincing ministry of Jonathan Grubb, and of Eli and Sybil Jones, who, with many another messenger of the evangel, were welcome visitors at her beautiful home. And thenceforward, closely joined with a deep distrust in any merit of her own, there grew up in her heart an everincreasing faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as a Saviour who bears away the guilt and burden of sin; a new and soul-satisfying revelation of the Cross of Christ, and a resulting " joy and peace in believing " which grew clearer and brighter with advancing years. " In these days, when we sometimes fear that the call to the ministry of the Gospel, with its high privileges," writes Mrs. Vigurs Harris in the Friend, in an article from which parts of this memoir have already been taken, "it is inspiring to recall the memory of one to whom the proclamation of Jesus Christ and Him crucified was, we may truly say, a master-passion of life. To very many outside the circle of her family and her own meeting, the enduring memory of Jane M. Richardson will be that of the fearless and uncompromising herald of salvation, calling men to repentance and proclaiming the evangel of Redeeming Love. In very early years the possibility of a call to this sacred service opened before her. We will quote her own words, dictated to one of her daughters not long before her death. 'My first memory of Moyallon meeting is, as a little girl, sitting on the step of the gallery facing the meeting, at my mother's feet. Even in those early days, I remember being deeply exercised, as far as a child could be, with the prospect that I might be called upon some day to speak in meeting. There I sat beside my mother, under the weight of this responsibility, which seemed like death to me. Nor was the burden greatly lightened when the call did come to me in later years.' From this extract we can understand, that when, soon after her marriage, she began to take vocal part in meetings for worship, a service which was easy for none in the days when Quaker ministry was hedged about with solemn and awful warnings against ' laying unhallowed hands on the ark of the Lord,' became a burden grievous to be borne. But when a new and clear revelation of ' the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ ' was translated into a living experience in her own soul, a new power and a new message were entrusted to her. Intensely interested in the currents of thought, which in later days especially have characterised the theological world, she nevertheless cherished a holy jealousy for the preservation of those vital truths which by the power of the Holy Ghost had been wrought into the warp and woof of her own spiritual being. The sacred mystery of the Atoning Death, the joy of Reconciliation, the assurance of Pardon and inward Peace, the conscious indwelling of a living Saviour, - these were the cardinal truths, passed through the alembic of a deep

personal experience, which formed at once the theme and the glory of a powerful and persuasive ministry. "Perhaps even more far-reaching than this public service was the great gift, - born of fellowship with her Lord in His travail for the souls of men, - of personal sympathy, - may we not even say of identification, - with the captives of temptation and sin, which led her, like the great Apostle, to be almost ready to be herself ' separated from Christ ' if by any means she could raise them into the life and light of God. Her life, once for all, proved to her children, and to all who knew her best, that the true evangelical faith means sharing the 'sorrows of the Head.' To them no one ever more clearly exemplified the mysterious truth of the fellowship with Christ in suffering to which the disciple is called - the oneness of the Christian with that sin and sorrow of others which he makes his own. To many a soul wandering in the desolation of intellectual doubt and despair, to many a man bound in the chains of evil habit or open sin, her believing prayers and unfaltering testimony to the might of a Divine Deliverer has brought the 'great enfranchisement,' the glorious liberty of the children of God.' Ever inclined to depreciate her own efforts and the effects of her own service (for 'her boast,' as one of her favourite Psalms says, 'was 'only 'in the Lord '), we think that she would be almost startled at the multiplied testimony that is now crowding in, to the definite spiritual change she was the means of making in numbers of human lives. " Many years before her illness, her beloved husband had been called to his eternal rest, and now the time drew near when the un-remitting labours of this saint of God must also cease. The strenuous life was now exchanged for ' the quiet resting places,' encompassed by the tenderness of heavenly and earthly love. After a Quarterly Meeting at Moyallon six years ago, she was seized by sudden illness which left her unable to wall?, and to some extent impaired her memory. Still her own characteristic self, with her natural sense of humour keen and strong, her thoughtful care for others never abating, she was spared to be the beloved centre of the family life, a centre unique and magnetic as ever, - kept on earth for the happiness of others. Lately she sometimes spoke of being 'glad to go,' often adding, 'Say of me, when the end comes, Unworthy, unworthy, but trusting in the precious Blood of Christ.' " On Christmas Day, 1908, she sustained a second stroke of paralysis, and from that time never regained full consciousness. Then followed days of reverent waiting, while she lay, with the seal of calm and conquest on her face; and the whole household hushed into sacred stillness. In speaking to the weeping people in the mission meeting at Moyallon on the Sunday evening after her death, one of her sons-in-law said : 'Her chamber was a temple of holy worship, where those who have ears to listen could hear the footfall of the Lord Himself.' "On the evening of Monday, January 4th, the summons came, and the faithful and loving spirit found its Home. She had come to the River, and for her, as for so many of God's pilgrims, ' there was no River.' Four days afterwards, all that was mortal of Jane M. Richardson was borne by the hands of those who loved her, from the home where she had spent the greater part of her devoted life. The storm of wind and rain which had been raging for some hours, became a calm, and as the long silent procession of mourners, gathered from far and near, moved towards the old country meeting-house, the sun broke forth and shone upon the words of the text which lay upon the coffin. To more than one it seemed that the strong and beautiful voice which so often had sounded forth messages of life, was once more speaking the uplifting word : 'Fear not, for I have redeemed thee : I have called thee by thy name ; thou art Mine.' "Around the open grave, the children of the Sunday School sang the hymn for which she had last asked, 'Jesu, lover of my soul.' In the crowded gathering in the Meeting-house, composed mainly of men, among whom were many clergymen and ministers and those drawn from various ranks in life, probably by far the larger number had known in their own lives her helpful and inspiring influence. Two days before, very appreciative notices of her 'great personality 'and of her valued labours in Temperance work and the public ministry, had appeared in the chief Irish papers. But in these last solemn moments, even this memory seemed to pass away, and to be lost, as she would have wished it to be, in the open vision and the adoring praise of that Saviour who had ' redeemed her unto God by His blood ' and who still is exalted ' Mighty to Save ' ! "

Portadown. A Minister.

The life of our dear friend Charles F. Wakefield almost spanned the nineteenth century. It was his privilege to have been nurtured in a Christian home, at a time when Ireland was recovering from the shock of a cruel rebellion, and when the Society of Friends was emerging from the effects of a sad Unitarian heresy which swept away most of those who held prominent places in it. The Rebellion of 1798 was a severe trial of the peace principles so precious to the Society of Friends, and to which they adhered with remarkable fidelity. It was a cause of great thankfulness that when, in the South of Ireland, Friends and their families were surrounded by robbery, destruction, and slaughter, only one young man lost his life. He had fled to a garrison town, and taken up arms against the rebels. While the strife continued Friends moved about unarmed, and were regarded as the friends both of the rebel and the loyalist.

When the wave of heresy had spent itself, it seemed as though the Society was almost desolated. Meetings for discipline had been discontinued, and disorder reigned throughout, until a few young men who had stood for the faith once delivered to the saints, became the means of restoring the discipline. Among the number was T. C. Wakefield, the father of the subject of this little memoir, who now filled the lapsed office of clerk in his own Monthly Meeting.

These trials, as we can well understand, imparted to those who remained faithful a robustness of Christian purpose which bore fruit in after life in the character of the dear friend we have under review. His father had married Jane S. Goff, of Co. Wexford. She proved a true helpmeet in times of joy and sorrow. A loving testimony to her worth as a wife may be inserted here. Her husband writes : " A better wife no man ever had. Her heart overflowed with love to me and all around. Her mind was stayed upon her God. Our children were tenderly brought up, and she was enshrined in their memory as a wise and loving parent."

In this christian home C. F. Wakefield grew to sturdy, thoughtless manhood - one among many instances of the fact that grace is not a matter of heredity, and that " no man can redeem his brother, or give to God a ransom for him."

His first childish recollection of prayer was u Our Father," learned in his mother's arms. On his return from school, his father, who bore firm rule in his own household, placed the lad in the linen business with himself. In all weathers his son attended the linen markets, making little of riding twenty or thirty miles in the early morning, to be in time for their opening. This mode of transit, so common at that time, probably fostered a love of riding, and intercourse with those who were outside the circle of his Ouakerly associations. Gradually he developed a passion for field sports, and for mixing with gay company, where his attractive appearance and manners made him a welcome guest.

In speaking of this period of his life he used to say : " A gentle and familiar step could be heard in the stillness of my chamber, and my mother would be at my bed-side, a feeling having taken possession of her mind that I needed a word in private, or that I might be intending to join the hunt on the morrow." He would then describe how touching her counsels proved in his experience, and how his proud spirit bowed under the power of maternal love. When, in his public addresses, he has often pleaded with the mothers respecting their privilege and power in leading their children early to God, a deep feeling has spread over the audience as he spoke of his own early experience.

During this time of thoughtless gaiety, although he was preserved from open vice, his parents were under much concern for his soul's welfare. We need hardly say his mother wrestled in prayer for her beloved son. And we shall now relate how prayer was answered so as to rejoice the hearts of those who loved him.

While quite a young man C. F. Wakefield found much interest in travelling as guide with J. J. Gurney and his party in the north and west of Ireland. The impressions then made, we cannot but believe, were never entirely dispelled.

When about twenty-six years of age he reached the crisis of his life, which we prefer to describe in his own words, as told to a relative about two years before his death. On asking for particulars, he replied, "Yes, I well remember the day. It was in Moyallon Meeting-house. Dear Stephen Grellet in his ministry laid my state open and bare. He then told me if I did not yield to the call of my Heavenly Father the consequences would be very sad. He proceeded to say, 'I see as it were the sword drawn, and it is about to fall if there is any hesitation on the part of an individual present to come out on the Lord's side.' I sat bowed to the ground. I knew his words had reference to my case. Blackness of darkness seemed before me, and I believed it would be my last call. There and then I yielded entirely to the power that spoke to me through my dear friend, and made no reserve. I had two horses in the stables ready for the season's hunting. I sold them, and carried my gun down to the river, broke it in two, and threw it in. I had made an appointment to meet some of my gay companions, and when they asked me why I did not keep my engagement, I told them frankly that I had for ever done with the world and its pleasures, and was now serving a better Master. "But no tongue can tell the agony I bad still to pass through as my past life came in review before me, and the requirements of my dear Heavenly Father were made plain. My precious mother used to come to my bedside, and sit with me far into the night, entering into my state with prayer and sympathy. She had long watched over my soul in those early days of carelessness and gaiety, and she now rejoiced on my account. Dear Stephen Grellet took me with him to the South of Ireland, and greatly confirmed me by his preaching and his love. In that journey a friend of mine and myself received a distinct call to the ministry of the Gospel. Through great mercy I yielded; but in the other case it was different, and loss and sorrow were the result. I cannot sufficiently praise and magnify the kindness and love of my Heavenly Father. I know I should not be here to-day had I not entered His service; and I can at least tell others that He has been a good and gracious Master." This occurred during Stephen Grellet's last visit to this country in 1833.

Having thus in his early youth yielded spirit, soul and body in obedience to the heavenly call he never swerved in his purpose of dedication, and was, after a time, recorded a minister of the Gospel in the Society of Friends. His ministry was often doctrinal, and very clear on the foundation truths of our hope in the love and mercy of God through His blessed Son. He was frequently led to speak of the baptism of Christ in distinction to the water baptism which John the forerunner had proclaimed; and very often it seemed his duty to point to the privilege which the believer enjoys in the spiritual communion of the bread and water of life.

The text was a very familiar one to his hearers : "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If any man hear My voice and open the door, I will come in to him and sup with him and he with Me." We thus become spiritual communicants at the Lord's table. How often, too, our dear friend endeavoured to impress upon his hearers the truth of the universality of divine grace, and the all-importance of that offering made on Calvary for the sins of the whole world.

In later years his spirit was more and more an exemplification of the apostle John's words : "he that loveth God loveth his brother also." He lived in the atmosphere of this divine love, in which he embraced mankind, narrowed by neither creed nor country.

For years he was a conspicuous figure in his neighbourhood, characteristic of a former generation of Quakerism, and much honoured and respected. Appeals of all kinds were carried to his door, and were met in the same spirit, and he would invite the bearer of such appeals to come in, and after some friendly talk he would sit in silence for a time, to seek guidance. It must be added he generally felt free to respond with help.

In 1839 he married Anne Moore, of Clonmel, a recorded minister. They did not seem called to labour much outside their native land, but continued united in spirit and in service, working for the good cause in

Ireland.

To his tenants C. F. Wakefield was a kind and thoughtful landlord, living on happy, friendly terms with them ; and not unfrequently did he return the rent to the needy, when wintry weather reminded him that fire and clothing would be necessary for the family.

His wife was removed by death in 1883; and although the stroke was deeply felt, he continued bright and cheerful in spirit, entertaining a strong persuasion that they were still united in the service of the same blessed Master.

His ninety-first birthday found him, in inclement wintry weather, travelling from Clonmel to his home at Portadown, some 150 miles. He did not appear the worse for the long day's journey. It was his last journey, and he died in harness, as the minute which he had received for service in the South of Ireland was never returned.

Once or twice afterwards he was out at Moyallon meeting, which he had attended regularly for eighty-seven years. His last address in the ministry was in Lurgan, where the word was with divine power, felt and alluded to by several present.

Three days afterwards he was attacked by influenza, followed by bronchitis. The acute stage of the illness passed off, but it left him so prostrate that although he lingered for several weeks, there seemed no power to rally. He was often engaged in prayer and thanksgiving, and those around him could say that the promise was fulfilled, "At evening time there shall be light." There was no pain nor any disease apparent, the suffering being only from extreme weakness. When those around expressed a hope that he would be raised up for a little while, he would often point upward and say, "He knows best; His will be done."

He rarely, if ever, mentioned death. The great enemy seemed, as in George Fox's case, scarcely worth a mention. Many times he exclaimed, "The Lord's mercies to me have been wonderful - wonderful to a poor unworthy servant. My only hope is in the Lamb of God, who taketh away the sin of the world." Gratitude for the kind attention of those around him was tenderly expressed. On the last morning his mind seemed wandering a little, and when a dear relative entered the room he exclaimed, as he drew her down for a fond embrace, " My dear child, thou hast come, and my dear mother has come also ": so strong in death was the memory of that beloved parent; and who can tell how near she was. " He giveth His angels charge "; They are sent forth to minister unto the heirs of salvation.

For many hours before his death he lay perfectly still; and just before the end, with a loud voice, he twice exclaimed, "I am going home ! I am going home ! " " Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."

General Notes: Cadbury, Dame Geraldine Southall (1865-1941), social and penal reformer, was born Geraldine Southall at 5 Highfield Road, Edgbaston, on 29 June 1865, the daughter of Alfred Southall (1838-1931), chemist, and his wife, Anna Strangman, née Grubb (1841-1912). She inherited a propensity for social activism from her Quaker parents; her father was a temperance worker who taught a working men's adult school class, while her Irish mother was a supporter of women's suffrage. She was educated at Edgbaston High School for Girls, and briefly at the Quaker school, The Mount, in York. On 8 September 1891, at the Friends' meeting house, Birmingham, she married Barrow Cadbury [see below]. They had three children: Dorothy Adlington (1892-1987), Paul

Strangman (1895-1984), and Geraldine Mary (1900-1999).

A committed Quaker, Geraldine Southall Cadbury reconciled her faith with the couple's increasing wealth by engaging in social reform; throughout her life, her activism was motivated by her Quaker faith. In 1904 she began a lifelong connection with the Birmingham Lying-in Charity and its services to poor mothers, officially opening its new maternity hospital buildings in Loveday Street in November 1907. She and her husband donated a nurses' hostel in 1933, and shortly before her death she was planning the hospital's new premises. Among her educational interests were the Birmingham People's Free Kindergarten established by Julia Lloyd in 1904, and the provision of open-air schools for inner-city children, the latter drawing on her own maternal experience. The health of her elder son as a child had caused concern and in 1907 the couple built a family home, Cropwood, in the Lickey Hills, designed on open-air principles. Seeing the beneficial effects on their own child, the Cadburys donated two open-air schools to Birmingham, Uffculme in 1911, and Cropwood itself in 1922.

Cadbury's other educational concerns were the Sunday school class where she taught from 1905, and her women's adult school class at Moseley Road which she led from 1907. In 1907 she and Barrow Cadbury founded Westhill Training College for Sunday School Workers, providing the building and most of the project's financial support. Her part in its establishment was recognized in 1917 by the National Sunday School Union when she was elected as its first woman president. In her presidential address, 'Stand by the children', she announced her campaign for the year, the 'difficult boy and girl' and the Sunday school's role in their reclamation for society, thereby uniting her interest in Sunday schools with the cause for which she is best remembered, the reform of the treatment of young offenders.

On 1 April 1905 at the instigation of a local justice, J. Courtney Lord, Birmingham established the first separate court for children in England. Modelled on American children's courts, the experiment led to the provision of juvenile courts in the Children's Act of 1908. In the same year as the court's inception Cadbury was invited by a fellow Quaker, Ellen Sturge, to accompany her on her regular visits to the courts. Together with Marian Priestman, another local Friend, she became a volunteer probation worker, supervising the case of every girl offender, investigating her home circumstances, and advising the appropriate course of action. She followed this up after sentencing by corresponding with every girl, always enclosing a stamped addressed envelope for a reply. Her work convinced her of the need for a safe home where children could be accommodated while on remand, and in 1910 she and Barrow Cadbury provided Birmingham with the first purpose-built children's remand home in Britain. They donated the site on the Moseley Road, established a voluntary management committee under their direction, and paid for the erection and furnishing of the building, which was largely designed by her. As for other buildings donated by the couple she drew detailed sketches of what she required, which were then handed to the architect to work up into building plans.

During the First World War, Cadbury organized temporary accommodation for hundreds of Belgian refugees at the Friends' Institute in Moseley Road and ran a Belgian maternity home at 19 Carpenter Road, receiving the medal of Queen Elisabeth of Belgium in 1918 in recognition of her services. A committed pacifist, she was one of the 156 members of the British committee of the Women's International Congress at The Hague (28 April - 1 May 1915), to which she and her daughter Dorothy had intended to travel but were refused passports. In the post-war period Cadbury was increasingly recognized as an expert on juvenile justice policy locally and nationally. Between 1911 and 1927 she was co-opted onto Birmingham education committee's special school sub-committee. In 1920, following the Sex Disqualification (Removal) Act of 1919, her position in Birmingham children's court was formalized when she and Marian Priestman became the city's first two women magistrates, and from 1923 she chaired the justices' panel in the children's court. In 1922 she was appointed to the Home Office 's advisory committee on probation, and in 1925 to the Home Office departmental committee on the treatment of young offenders, the committee that laid the ground for the Children's Act of 1933. As part of her investigations for the young offenders community where young offenders were psychologically assessed. Cadbury had a long-standing interest in psychology; Dr George Auden acted as psychological adviser to her Moseley Road Remand Home from its establishment, and from the early 1920s the Birmingham children's court used two local doctors, W. A. Potts and Hamblin Smith, as experts in child psychology. The visit to Moll convinced her of the value of observation homes and when the young offenders committee reported in 1927 it recommended that at least three British observation centres should be established to provide psychological reports on all offenders under the age of twenty-one. Much to her disappointment, and that of the Howard League, financial

During the 1920s Cadbury took part in campaigns against the death penalty, and from 1923 supported the work of what later became the National Council for the Abolition of the Death Penalty. She also travelled widely, investigating juvenile justice provision in Europe, America, New Zealand, and Australia, often combining her interests with Barrow's business travels and visits to Quaker international gatherings. In 1928 the fruits of her travels fed into her designs for a new children's court complex in Steelhouse Lane, Birmingham, only the second purpose-built juvenile court in England. Presented to the city by the couple, the court was officially opened by the home secretary, Sir William Joynson-Hicks, on 17 July 1928. Her beliefs were incorporated into its fabric in the form of the ceremonial key which showed Justice unveiled and without a sword, symbolizing justice with understanding.

Cadbury was instrumental in the establishment of the Birmingham Child Guidance Clinic, founded by Birmingham city council's education committee in 1931, initially for an experimental period of three years. It was funded by the Commonwealth Fund of New York supplemented by an anonymous local donation of £1500, which may well have come from her. In 1935 she and Barrow Cadbury founded Copeley Hill Hostel for boys and Carpenter House Probation Hostel for girls. She also continued to be appointed to Home Office committees, including the committee to inquire into juvenile courts in the Metropolitan Police district (1930-41), the juvenile court rules committee (1932), the conference on girls aged 15-17 appearing before London juvenile courts (1934), and the committee to consider observation centres (1938). From 1935 she was vice-president of the International Association of Children's Court Judges. Her book Young Offenders Yesterday and To-day (1938) stressed the transformative power of education and personal intervention in the lives of the young, and articulated her long-held belief that the juvenile court was there to protect rather than to punish, and that child offenders were not intrinsically flawed but were reacting to their environment, poverty, poor parenting, and a lack of alternative role models. In May 1937 Geraldine Cadbury was appointed DBE 'for public and philanthropic services in Birmingham' (London Gazette, 11 May 1937, 3089), a worldly honour that as a Quaker she seriously considered declining. She rarely used the title, preferring to be known as Mrs Barrow Cadbury. She died at her home, 40 Edgbaston Park Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham, on 30 January 1941.

Geraldine married **Barrow Cadbury**,² son of **Richard Cadbury**^{2,114,210,211} and **Elizabeth Adlington**,^{2,211} on 8 Sep 1891 in Birmingham, Warwickshire. Barrow was born on 27 Sep 1862 in 17 Wheeley's Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham and died on 9 Mar 1958 in 73 Wellington Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham at age 95. They had three children: Dorothy Adlington, Paul Strangman, and Geraldine Mary.

General Notes: She was survived by her husband, Barrow Cadbury (1862-1958), cocoa and chocolate manufacturer and social reformer, who was born in Edgbaston, Birmingham, on 27 September 1862, the son of Richard Cadbury (1835-1899), cocoa manufacturer, and his first wife, Elizabeth Adlington (1838-1868). His mother died when he was six years old. After schooling locally, at the age of eleven he was sent to a Realschule in Stuttgart, before attending a Quaker school at Hitchin from the age of fourteen. This was followed by two years at Owens College, Manchester, and an apprenticeship in London. In 1882 he completed a two-month tour of Canada and the USA, investigating American chocolate manufacture, before joining the family firm. On his father's death he became one of four directors of a new limited company under the chairmanship of his uncle, George Cadbury. From 1914 Barrow was vice-chairman of Cadbury Brothers Ltd. In 1918 he negotiated a merger, against his uncle's wishes, with J. S. Fry & Sons of Bristol to form a new holding company, the British Cocoa and Chocolate Company. On George Cadbury's death in 1922 Barrow became chairman of Cadbury Brothers Ltd until his retirement in 1932.

Oujet and reserved, Barrow Cadbury's Ouaker faith and pacifist principles were central to his life. He was active in his local meeting at George Road and from 1898 at Highgate Mission. In the same year he was made an elder of the Warwickshire monthly meeting and later served as clerk to the quarterly meeting. Nationally he was a regular attender at yearly meeting and a member of the meeting for sufferings. In 1923 he played a key role in the building of Friends' House in Euston Road, London, raising much of the necessary funds as treasurer of the building committee. Like his father, he had a lifelong interest in adult education and taught a working men's class throughout his life. Following his father's death he inherited the management of his recently built Moseley Road Institute for adult education. He served on the council of the National Adult School Union and was its treasurer (1907-22), and president (1926-7). Before the First World War, Barrow Cadbury was involved in Anglo-German friendship initiatives, hosting visits by German peace delegations in 1906 and 1911, and participating in several return delegations to Germany, the last shortly before the outbreak of war in 1914. During the war he was an early member of the Fellowship of Reconciliation in 1915, and supported the work of the Friends' War Victims Relief Committee, the Friends' Emergency Committee for the Relief of Enemy Aliens, and the Friends' Ambulance Unit in which his son, Paul, served. He maintained his witness for peace during the 1930s when he supported George Lansbury's Embassies of Reconciliation initiative. After the Second World War he collaborated with a fellow Quaker, Kathleen Lonsdale, on a series of letters to world leaders pressing for peace and disarmament, the last of which was written in 1957 a few months before his death. Barrow Cadbury shared his wife's interest in penal reform and served as a magistrate from 1906 to 1940, often presiding in the children's court. Following Geraldine's death Barrow Cadbury continued to support the causes she espoused, and purchased Forhill House intending to establish an observation home for young offenders in her memory. However, delays with Forhill prompted him to begin experimental work at Fircroft College, Selly Oak, where her Moseley Road Remand Home had been evacuated following bomb damage, and which in effect became the first British observation home. He persevered with Forhill, which was officially opened on 30 May 1947 as a Senior Boys' Remand and Observation Home and presented to the city in Geraldine Cadbury's memory.

In 1920 the couple had converted a large proportion of their fortune into the charitable Barrow Cadbury Trust. Birmingham Civic Society awarded its gold medal to them in 1931 in recognition of their contribution to the city. Although he never coveted public honour and often worked anonymously, Barrow Cadbury was granted the freedom of the city of Birmingham in 1932. He died at his home, 73 Wellington Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham, on 9 March 1958.

Details Paul Hickinbotham was a consultant surgeon in Leicester. He was born in Birmingham on 21 March 1917, the second son of Frederick John Long Hickinbotham, an export merchant and JP, and Gertrude née Ball. He was educated at West House School, Birmingham, and Rugby, and went on to Birmingham to do his medical training, qualifying in 1939. There he was much influenced by H H Sampson, a charismatic general surgeon from the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. Hickinbotham went on to specialise in surgery, becoming resident surgical officer at Bradford Royal Infirmary from 1941 to 1942, when he passed the FRCS.

Son of John Taylor, a stockbroker, and Mary Jane Cash; was born at Peckham Rye on Feb 1st, 1871, and was educated at King's College, London. He matriculated at Cambridge from Caius College on Oct 1st, 1889, where he resided for five terms but did not graduate. He then entered Guy's Hospital, where he was House Surgeon and Resident Obstetrician. Later he was Assistant Medical Officer at the London Temperance Hospital.

Four months later, after gaining her teaching diploma, she joined Ernest in Kuala Lumpur. A daughter and three sons were born there. She taught at several schools and was involved in the Girl Guides movement.

Following the Japanese invasion of Malaya Mary Hodgkin and her four children were evacuated in January 1942 to Perth and her husband was interned in Singapore. Helped by local Quakers to find temporary accommodation, she soon bought a house at Cottesloe, using a legacy from an uncle. She taught part time (1942-55) at various schools, including Presbyterian Ladies College (1942-54), and continued her association with the Girl Guides, becoming a district commissioner. In October 1945 Ernest joined his family and next year was appointed a lecturer in biology at the University of Western Australia.

In 1956 Mary Hodgkin returned to study as one of the first students in the new department of anthropology and comparative sociology established by Ronald Berndt at UWA (BA Hons, 1959; MA, 1962). In her honours thesis-published as The Asian Student in the University of Western Australia (1958)-she made useful suggestions (later implemented by the university) for assisting overseas students. Research for her master's thesis covered a wider sample of students including those attending schools and technical colleges.

Appointed by the government of Malaya (Malaysia from 1963), Mrs Hodgkin served (1959-72) as a liaison officer for the country's students at UWA, providing generous hospitality, practical help and emotional support to hundreds of them. From 1965 she also cared for students from Singapore. A Freda Bage fellowship of the Australian Federation of University Women enabled her to spend eight months in 1961 in Malaya to gauge the adjustment of returned graduates. Assisted by a grant from the Myer Foundation, she travelled to Britain and the United States of America in 1967 to learn how these countries aided Malaysian students. In 1972-80 she was UWA's honorary adviser to overseas students.

Mary Hodgkin tutored and lectured (1965-77) in the department of anthropology; her students remembered her as a lively, interesting and caring teacher. Her publications included Australian Training and Asian Living (1966) and The Innovators: The Role of Foreign Trained Persons in South-East Asia (1972). Active in the Anthropological Society of Western Australia, she was made an honorary life member in 1982. She served on the council of the Girl Guides Association of Western Australia until 1974. In 1972 she was awarded an honorary Ahli Mangku Negara by the Malaysian government, and in 1976 the British Empire medal. She enjoyed painting in water-colours. Survived by her husband and their four children, she died on 1 March 1985 at her Mosman Park home and was cremated.

Another retired lecturer Miss Musgrave Davidson added: "Oonah headed a happy group at the college. She was a visionary ahead of her time."

Miss Pim's services to education in Northern Ireland were recognised when she was awarded an OBE in 1973.

In 2003 aged 90, her contribution to the development of the University of Ulster was recognised when she was awarded an honorary doctorate. In her retirement, Dr Pim moved to the village of Solva in south west Wales.

Dr Pim was cremated at Parc Gwyn Crematorium, Narbeth, Pembrokeshire, and her ashes were scattered in a garden.

A Quaker Silence was observed in Solva. Dr Pim is survived by her nephew David Pim and his family.

From that industry the flour milling was a development, and it was S.R's grandfather who, in 1814, established the business which became the Bishopwearmouth Steam Mills, and which in turn was carried on and developed by the founder's son, Caleb, and eventually by Stansfield Richardson and his brothers Edwin and Frederick. S. R. retired from the business in 1907, after having being associated with the management for fifty years. In 1897 S. R. entered the Town Council, his election being unopposed, an experience repeated so long as he remained a Councillor. After success in the 1894 Indian Civil Service exams, Pim arrived in India on 4 December 1895. He held various positions in the North Western Provinces and Oudh (later the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh) including, briefly, from May 1898, those as private secretary to the lieutenant-governor, Sir James La Touche, and as assistant settlement, and then settlement, officer. Pim published a monograph on the region's woollen industries in 1898. In 1903 he was appointed to the provincial legislature, and then in 1910 was made the joint secretary of the board of revenue. Remaining in India during the war, Pim served as secretary to the government from April 1912 to August 1917. In 1916 he married Nora Gordon, daughter of Sir J. Scott. Appointed divisional commissioner, in April 1925 he returned to the board of revenue as commissioner. Pim was selected as a temporary member of the United Provinces executive council in December 1928. He retired in July 1930 having been made CIE in June 1918, CSI in January 1926, and KCIE in June 1929. Pim belonged to both the Royal Asiatic Society and the Punjab Historical Society. In 1935 he was made KBE. His most notable and important work, investigating the financial and economic conditions of British colonies, chiefly African, began in 1932 when the Colonial Office appointed Pim to carry out a financial and economic inquiry in Swaziland. Pim undertook similar commissions in Zanzibar, also in 1932, where he re

settlers (Bennett, 326). His last major appointment was as financial and economic commissioner in Northern Rhodesia in 1937, and his painstaking work on these commissions, by highlighting the need for colonial economic reform, contributed to the late 1930s official reassessment of colonial development policy.

The Colonial Office continued thereafter to draw on his expertise, with Pim advising in a report submitted in 1948 against the possibilities of large-scale settlement of European displaced persons in Kenya, Tanganyika, and Northern Rhodesia. Pim also served from 1935 on the colonial development advisory committee. All this experience equipped him for subsequent activities as a speaker and writer concerned with African economic conditions. He gave the 1938 Beit lectures on colonial economic history at the University of Oxford, published in 1940 as The Financial and Economic History of the African Tropical Territories, paying particular attention to the application of European capital, and produced Colonial Agricultural Production under the auspices of Chatham House. A draft of a book dated 1953 entitled 'The dependent empire' went unpublished.

Little is known about Pim's private life, but he listed his hobbies as 'rather indefinite, books generally, and some games; later, travel' (Bootham School Register, 183). He died aged eighty-seven at the White House, Headington Hill, Oxford, on 28 June 1958. He was survived by Lady Pim.

Tom lived his life in a spirit of abundance and joy. He worked to resolve challenges with enthusiasm and practical creativity. Tom was sensitive to others' needs and quick to ofer both emotional and practical help. His playful wit made many a dry Quaker committee pleasurable. He lived the Quaker testimony to simplicity with a quiet, persistent grace, never ostentatious in dress or lifestyle. Tom was a good and faithful Friend from childhood to his death aged 84 in 2014. Tom's lodestones were his family, Quakers, the environment and technological innovation. Tom once said of meeting: "In my younger days, the dominant reason [for my attendance] was to learn from the meeting - and to develop my understanding of life - physical, mental and spiritual - and my values. I then found ways I could contribute as well as receive, and hence developed a feeling of being part of a community to which I owed a duty. Meeting has become a valued and central part of my life which I would feel deprived of if I lived out of reach of a Quaker meeting." In meetings Tom always spoke quietly, but with authority. Over his 57 years at Cotteridge Meeting he served in numerous capacities: overseer, elder, treasurer and clerk amongst others. Tom undertook what he called "a whole new career" when, in 1996, he became treasurer of Warwickshire Monthly Meeting. Tom had a rich baritone singing voice and derived much pleasure from music, enriching both Cotteridge Meeting's social and practical activities. Tom's rendition of "Right Said Fred" greatly sustained Cotteridge Friends' DIY revamping of the meeting house in 2006. Tom supported the Leaveners, singing in The Gates of Greenham, Cry of the Earth, Embracing the Tiger, and Woolman's Witness. Born in Portadown, Northern Ireland, Tom was the youngest of fve children in a Quaker family. Every morning after breakfast, joined by their domestic staff, the household read from the Bible. From a very young age he opted to sit through the whole of their Quaker meeting. The ideals of public service exemplifed by generations of his family took deep root in Tom's own character. Tom boarded very happily at Leighton Park School before studying Mechanical and Electrical Engineering at Queen's University, Belfast where he met Isabel. In 1955, having completed a graduate apprenticeship with Rolls Royce, Tom joined Cadbury Brothers Ltd and married. Cadburys seconded Tom to their factory in Tasmania for a year. Here he and Isabel took great joy from both Hobart Quaker Meeting and the natural beauty of Tasmania. On their return to England in 1957 the Greeves settled in Bournville, Birmingham, and became part of Cotteridge Quaker Meeting. Suzy, Geoff and Marion joined the family, and the meeting, in due course. In the mid 1970s, dawn of the digital age, Tom, constantly desiring to be at the cutting edge of technology, completed an Open University degree in Electronic Engineering. At Cadbury's, meanwhile, Tom developed the Systems Engineering Department. Tom had a 'conversion experience' when he read Limits to Growth in 1972, halfway through his life, leading to a passionate concern for the health of our earth. His response, which took much of his time in the second half of his life, was wide ranging and practical as well as intellectual. From 1971-2003 Tom served as a trustee of the Bournville Village Trust (BVT), acting as vice chairman for 14 years. Tom steered the BVT decisively towards sustainability. He was the catalyst for a growing commitment to the need for energy saving technology in buildings ranging from the innovative Solar Village of the 1980s to the Shenley Development launched in 2003. Tom co-authored several academic papers for the International Solar Energy Society based on this pioneering work. Tom quietly began work on reducing energy use at Cotteridge Meeting House in 2002 with donations of a solar thermal panel and, later, of double glazed window panels to replace the 'glass walls' (which had been cutting edge design in 1964). Tom's constancy supported the small Cotteridge Meeting Living Witness Group, which informed and encouraged meeting in its energy saving measures from 2004 through 2011, resulting in energy use reduction of over 90%. When issues afecting the environmental impact of the meeting or meeting house came before local business meeting, Tom invariably spoke clearly and movingly on their behalf. Central England Quakers agreed, in 2007, to create the Northfeld Ecocentre, a project which promotes sustainable living. Tom was deeply involved from its inception and planning. He contributed funding, time and practical ingenuity to make the Ecocentre, an old building, a demonstration of energy efficiency. Tom acted as Ecocentre treasurer for six years, a vital support to the new project. He was key to the success of the Ecocentre. Tom's deep commitment to peace and the protection of our environment is expressed in his own words in his contribution to Cotteridge Meeting's 2004 'Living Minutes' project: "...we are people trying to learn to live in harmony with one another and to care for a lovely planet...the meaning and purpose of life is therefore centred around that endeavour, lightened by beauty, joy and laughter. To succeed we need to develop the power of love, and not the love of power, and to open our hearts and minds to the leadings of the Spirit of Love". In the last year of his final illness Tom continued to show a quiet fortitude and good humour despite his decreasing physical strength. His was truly a life that spoke to all who knew him as one who walked "cheerfully over the world, answering that of God in every one".
